Christmas in Haiti

Did you know that in Haiti, people celebrate Christmas in some of the same ways we do here in America? It is a tradition for Haitians to cut pine branches to serve as Christmas trees or go to the market and purchase a tree from the mountains (if they can afford it). They decorate the branches (or trees) with bright ornaments and at the base they add a nativity scene. Many times these Christmas displays take up a large part of their living area. Because both French and Haitian Creole is spoken in Haiti, Merry Christmas is either 'Joyeux Noel' (French) or 'Jwaye Nowe' (Creole).

Haitians also have some Christmas traditions that are different then ours. They decorate their homes with 'Fanals' which is the French word for lantern. These are intricately designed paper boxes that are cut and decorated with tissue paper before being placed on porches or in windows with a candle to light them. On Christmas Eve, children place their newly cleaned shoes, filled with straw on the porch in the hope that Santa (called 'Tonton Nwel') will remove the straw and put presents in and around the shoes! Some people go to mass (a church service) at midnight and afterward come home to eat the main Christmas meal. This meal is called 'reveillon' which means 'to wake up' in French and can last from sometime after midnight until sun up on Christmas morning!

Because many Haitians are very poor, the emphasis at Christmas is not on gifts or the money spent but on the gathering together of friends and family and the traditions that they share.
