Sin – Joy hindered by guilt (Eph. 4:17-19, Rom. 2:15)

Christ – Joy Made Possible through New Covenant Cleansing (Heb. 10:22)

Repentance – Gateway to Joy (Ps. 32)

Sanctification – Experiencing New Covenant Realities (Rom. 14:17, 1 Cor. 10:23-24)

**Return of Christ** – Joy in Judgment and Forever (Acts 24:14-16)

Summary: The Joy of a Clean Conscience Class – Spring 2021

1. What is the conscience and why is it important?

The conscience is a dynamic, God-given capacity to distinguish right from wrong so that we might respond accordingly.

- #1. An informed conscience enjoys God's gifts as He intended (1 Tim. 4:1-5)
- #2. There are spiritual consequences for how we maintain it (1 Tim. 1:18-19, Rom. 14:22-23)
- #3. Christ's redemption includes the joy of a cleansed conscience. (Heb. 9-10)
- #4. By ignoring conscience we can damage those in the church and by listening to it we can be a fruitful leader (1 Cor. 8:11-13, 1 Tim. 3:9)

## 2. How does the gospel allow me to live with a clean conscience before God?

- #1. God has revealed His character through creation and His Law through conscience and Scripture. Humans reject this revelation. (Rom. 1:18-21, 28, 32; 2:12-16; Eph. 4:18-20)
- #2. All human beings don't meet God's moral standard and are therefore guilty. The conscience is God's gracious, diagnostic tool but does not clean our consciences. (Mt. 7:15-20; Rom. 3:9, 19; 4:15; 7:7; Gal. 3:21-22; Heb. 9:6-10, 10:1-4; Jms 4:17)
- #3. Spiritually Telling Responses Repentance or Denial. (2 Cor. 7:8-9; ie. Judas and Peter)
- #4. Christ's sacrifice removes the barrier between us and God and cleanses our conscience. This is an objective and experiential reality. (Heb. 9:11-14, 10:15-25)

# 3. How do I tune or calibrate my conscience?

There is a calibration spectrum and standard (Bible). (Spectrum: 1 Tim. 1:19, 4:2; Titus 1:15; Heb. 10:22; 1 Cor. 8:7, 10; Standard: Acts 10/Gal. 2:11-14; Rom. 12:2, 14:5-7; Heb. 5:11-14)

- #1. The conviction or affirmation of the Holy Spirit (Rom. 9:1)
- #2. Scripture (Heb. 4:12, 2 Tim. 3:16, Rom. 7:22-24, 1 Cor. 10:23-26)
- #3. Experience (Consequences / Rewards)
- #4. Church and Others (1 Cor. 8:1-6, 10:23-28)

# 4. How does Scripture help me to navigate differences of opinion regarding matters of conscience?

Questions to ask ourselves in calibrating our conscience and in navigating conscience conflicts:

#### **SCRIPTURE**

- 1. How does Scripture speak to this issue?<sup>1</sup>
- 2. What Scriptural priority, relevance and proportion does it have?<sup>2</sup>

- a. Priority = theological triage: essential for gospel, urgent for church life, important but not worth separating over, unimportant
- b. Relevance = not all Scripture is relevant to every issue, context is key
- c. Proportion = amount of Scriptural support informs level of conviction

### **WISDOM**

- 3. Have I listened humbly and carefully to...<sup>3</sup>
  - a. those I respect (alive and dead)?
  - b. the best explanation of both sides of the issue?
  - c. those who I initially disagree with?
- 4. Have I spent time in honest prayer before God regarding this issue?4
- 5. Am I fully persuaded that it is right and profitable? Would I be sinning or subjecting myself to temptation by doing it?<sup>5</sup>

### GOD

6. Which side of this issue would honor God, imitate Jesus, and further the cause of the gospel most? 6

### **OTHERS**

- 7. Which response would help build others up and put others first in this situation? <sup>7</sup>
- 8. Are my actions tempting others to violate their consciences before God? 8
- 9. Am I in a relational position to influence "the weak" in regard to this issue? What is my attitude towards them (compassionate, judgmental, arrogant)? 9
- 10. What would help the church to be united in the truth and growing in maturity?  $^{10}$
